

WINSTON-SALEM 2009: A Very Successful Festival! by Mike Sullivan



It's been a little over a month since festival week wrapped up in Winston-Salem, and by now most of us have had a chance to look at the photos we took, practice the new tricks we learned, and reflect on the fest in general now that the emotions of the week have subsided.

If you were there this year, I hope you had a great time. Based on the survey results, most everyone did! Tireless work and enthusiasm from dozens and dozens of IJA volunteers helped the week run smoothly, and the cooperation of the fantastic people in Winston-Salem and the venues we used made everything so much easier. It's obvious that returning to a beautiful city that genuinely appreciates having the IJA visit for a week makes a huge difference in planning and execution for such a mammoth effort as a week-long international festival run by volunteers.

The one obvious glitch during the week was the Saturday night food service at the Juggle Jam party. Unfortunately, we received some bad advice from the convention center banquet sales team on how to provide that service, and as you know it ruined the dinner for many of us who had to wait in long lines for a diminishing quantity of food. No excuses: that's my fault for not thinking through how to feed 500 people in a half-hour quickly and efficiently. There are ways it can be done, and I know all of those ways, but I trusted the catering team to make things work for us using their recommended approach. Hopefully, the great DJ and dance party that followed the dinner and awards redeemed the evening for many of us!

And in case you're wondering why we even bother with a banquet each year: our contract with the convention facility requires a certain minimum dollar volume of food and beverage during the week. This is standard practice in the meeting and convention industry, for meetings of all sizes in any kind of hotel or convention space. Thankfully for the IJA, our contract in Winston-Salem called for a very reasonable "F&B" number that didn't break our budget, and which was easily satisfied by the Juggle Jam party. If we did not meet that minimum, the IJA would have been liable for many, many thousands of dollars in penalty fees...therefore, the banquet is a must.

Speaking of which, the early word from Holly Greeley, the IJA bookkeeper, is that the IJA made a sizeable profit on this year's fest. In fact, it looks like we made more money in 2009 than we did during the 2007 festival in Winston-Salem, even though we had a few hundred less people attending


this year. That's another example of how things can go smoothly and affordably when we return to a city in which we've already had success.

Spending my first year of retirement working on the 2009 festival as the festival director was a great experience. I was able to get to know and work alongside many talented, generous people, and I got to try out ideas I'd had as a festival attendee for many years. It also gave me a deep appreciation for how much the IJA depends on a very, very small core of dedicated volunteers to keep going.

And now, it's on to 2010! The search for a festival director for next year is on, so if you're interested or know someone who might be, please speak up! Plus, we're working on site selection for 2011 and beyond, with a great proposal already in hand from a Midwestern city that would love to have some jugglers in town for a week.

And finally, one little benefit of being the festival director is having "All Access" clearance to places normally off-limits to festival-goers. I shot over 1,600 snaps during the 12 days I was in Winston-Salem for the festival, and someday soon I'll get a nice album put together of those memories. But one photo I took is worth sharing with you now: I really enjoyed going backstage after the Cascade of Stars show on Friday night to grab this special snapshot of the amazing cast from that performance. Board Profile - Kevin McBeth



I was born in Weatherford, OK, and I learned to juggle at the age of nine seeing a juggler perform at the elementary school I was attending. Within a few months of learning to juggle, my family moved to a suburb of St. Paul, where I was able to juggle at the Minnesota Neverthriving juggling club.

In 2000, my family moved to Topeka, KS, where a lack of local

jugglers meant my interest waned during my high school years. Fortunately, I headed off to Kansas State for college, where Ryan Bradburn had just started up the K-State Juggling Club. As the club grew and K-State started holding the Little Apple Juggling Festival, my interest in juggling was revitalized. The 2nd Annual Little Apple Juggling Festival, which was coordinated by Becca Smith, was the key moment in that revitalization.

In 2007, I graduated from college and returned to the St. Paul area to begin my 'real life' (and return to Minnesota Neverthriving).

I joined the IJA at Flatland Festival that year. Steve Rahn offered a copy of JuggleVision if I signed up, and I just couldn't say 'no'. My first IJA Festival was the following year in Lexington (after 14 years of juggling), and it was quickly apparent how much fun I had been missing out on.

Outside of juggling, I work in the Actuarial Leadership Development Program at Travelers Insurance, where I just moved from working with Bond & Financial Products insurance to Oil & Gas insurance. I'm studying to take the 6th Casualty Actuarial Society Exam (of 9) in October, and I'm hoping to complete the actuarial exam process in a couple of years. I also enjoy listening to and playing music. During college, I studied piano and organ, and played percussion and piano in the K-State Symphony Orchestra.

JAQ Invited to Juggle at Mt. Tremblant, by Don Lewis

Recent years have seen Mt. Tremblant transformed from a winter ski mountain into a year 'round destination resort. The base of the mountain has been transformed into a Disney-like alpine village full of restaurants, shops, bars, ice cream kiosks, public squares and gardens.

Les Jongleurs Associés du Québec were recently invited to come and provide demonstrations, animation, and juggling lessons to the wandering throngs of tourists. A dozen jugglers set up in one of the squares on Saturday afternoon and juggled the afternoon away. It may have been mid August, but it was really the first hot sunny weekend the region has seen all summer so the crowds were out in force. As their parents stopped to watch, kids found themselves trying spinning plates, devil sticks, balls, and green clubs. Some adults were surprised to discover that the juggling that they had learned as children snapped right back into place.

We handed out a lot of business cards with the JAQ web address and meeting times on one side, and the IJA business card printed on the other. I was able to tell anyone who wasn't local to take a card anyway and check out the IJA.

We also handed out the Green Club plans to anyone who showed interest. More than one parent brightened considerably with the thought that this new interest was not going to cost a fortune - at least not right away.

One bemused mother spent the better part of two hours watching her daughter progressively try balls, plates, devil sticks and clubs. As she was leaving, with arms full of prop brochures left over from the Montreal fest, I grabbed three Green Clubs from the bin and gave them to the girl to take home. A small reward for juggling in the hot sun. I won't be at all surprised if she shows up at a JAQ club meeting in the fall looking for tricks and ready to learn passing. Of course, I think I got the real reward - a brilliant smile from a new

club juggler. A pretty good return for the few minutes it takes to make the clubs.

Natacha brought her foot juggling apparatus and demonstrated just how elegant and impressive that skill can be. Lots of kids got to try it out with her expert help. In exchange for trying out my torches, she convinced me to try out her specialty too.

First I folded myself into a special support that has the neck and shoulders flat, with the hips and legs up in the air. Next, I learned to toss a long cylinder straight up with my The cylinder has to stay hands and catch it again. horizontal. The next step was to throw it higher than my feet, which were sticking way up in the air. You have to point your toes skyward as the cylinder is going up to avoid knocking it back towards your face. You are supposed to bend your knees as you catch the cylinder with your feet. For some reason, my legs wanted to do the opposite, so I was actually kicking the thing higher and then catching it. I was amazed that within a few minutes I was actually having some success at something it had never occurred to me to try. Although it looks awkward, the position is surprisingly comfortable.

Later on at home, I searched the internet to see how to build a foot juggling support frame. You can find out how to make just about anything on the internet, yet this apparatus seems to be an exception. I did discover that it is called a Trinka. There are two foam covered bars to keep your shoulders from slipping, and an inclined back support. I saw pictures of custom made professional circus equipment, but no plans or suggestions for the do-it-yourself crowd. Late in the afternoon our stint finished. We all repaired to a nearby pizza bar where large vegetarian pizzas, cold beer, peanuts and shade revived us for the trip home.

A lot of juggling was done, a lot of people were amazed, lots of kids and no few adults went away with a new skill, and I learned something new! It was worth the trip.
