



CONVENTION REPORT Newark, Delaware

The 1977 IJA Convention held Wednesday through Sunday, July 13-17, at the University of Delaware was all that one could hope for in a juggling convention. It was well organized, held at a fine site, and had the best attendance ever (close to 300 people).

Wednesday.

Jugglers arriving in the middle to late afternoon Wednesday at the convention site, beautiful John M. Clayton Hall on the campus of the University of Delaware, found many jugglers already juggling away in the large, well lit, convention room with its carpetted floor perfect for juggling. Upon arrival, most people who attended the convention checked into one of the many comfortable dormitory rooms which are located in buildings surrounding the convention center (good cafeteria and sandwich counter facilities were also available in the same complex). Around 5 pm Wednesday a caravan of cars and a chartered school bus carried everyone who arrived early enough to the pre-convention picnic.

The picnic was held about twenty miles from the convention site at the farm residence of Mr. and Mrs. Clement R. Hoops, Tom Dewart's mother and stepfather. Called "Windfall Farm", the Hoops' gracious residence includes tree-shaded lawns, gardens, swimming pool, farm fields, fire flies, and cow pastures (the cows seemed rather surprised by all the jugglers' cars parked in their territory but found them useful as back scratching boards). There was an immediate outbreak of juggling and other activity including club passing formations on the lawn, five club juggling duels between Barrett Felker and Steve Mills, people happily reuniting with old friends, Tom Dewart lobbying for the next year's convention to be held in Oregon, people deciding to attend the next year's convention wherever it was (remember, this was only in the first few hours of this year's convention), Steve Mills riding his six foot unicycle in the swimming pool, Frisbee games, and so In addition to hosting the IJA, the Hoops had also invited a number of their friends to the picnic, and a few jugglers were drafted to put on an impromptu show for the Hoops' friends on the lawn in front of the house (see the

photograph elsewhere in this issue of Don and Lana Reed performing in that setting). Seeing a few of their colleagues performing stimulated a number of other jugglers to insert themselves into the show, to everyone's great pleasure. After a fine picnic supper which the Hoops' family served, juggling and socializing recommenced and continued until it was so dark outside that there was nothing to do but to return to the University. We reluctantly left the peaceful country setting and gracious hospitality of Windfall Farm.

Arriving back at the University at about 10 pm, we discovered that all those who had arrived at the convention site after the mass departure for the picnic were juggling on the outdoor basketball court by the light of some rather feeble flood lights. With the addition of many who had been to the picnic, the spontaneous gathering on the basketball court became a major juggling session. Including club passing formations on six- and eight-foot unicycles and an amazing number of jugglers juggling five clubs, the session continued until the University finally turned out the outdoor lights, pitching the basketball court into darkness (and even then some people tried to continue juggling).

Thursday.

Bright and early Thursday morning we were back at the convention room ready for some serious juggling. I love to watch good club passers, and I was not disappointed Thursday morning: Judy and Hovey Burgess and Stu Raynolds did an eleven club twohanded feed. Judy and Hovey showered seven clubs standing back to back, and facing each other they passed eight, nine, and ten clubs. Hovey and Joe Temple threw shoulders to each other with single and double turns in a seven club shower pattern. Joe, Hovey, and Judy juggled in a ten club line with Judy in the middle position from which she would hold three clubs and stop juggling, leaving Joe and Hovey showering seven clubs between them, and then Judy would switch back into the ten club line pattern, all without Hovey and Joe missing a single pass at the seven club shower passing rate. There was a lot of other spectacular juggling such as Don and Lana breaking spontaneously into their Fantasy Jugglers act to everybody's great pleasure, and there was lots of average (continued on page 7)

juggling, too. There was also a brief executive board meeting Thursday morning for which the IJA officers were momentarily dragged away from their juggling and at which a nominating committee for the next day's election was appointed.

Thursday morning a film crew from TV Channel 12, the Wilmington, Delaware, public service channel, was at the convention filming the activities; and an eight minute feature on the convention was later broadcast over channel 12. Later in the convention, during the competition, a film crew from Big Fight Incorporated was filming, hoping for a five club juggling record which could be submitted to the Guinness Book of World Records with which Big Fight has an arrangement. The convention was well publicized with much newspaper as well as TV coverage. The Wilmington News Journal carried a big preconvention piece featuring the attendance at the convention of Garbo and Jillian and later carried a story on the public show, the Philadelphia Inquirer carried a front page story on the convention, the Delaware State News of Dover, Delaware, carried an item on the convention, and Town Talk, the neighborhood newspaper for the Brandywine section of Wilmington also covered the convention.

Thursday morning also included workshops which many of us attended. Jerry Greenberg and Mike Marlin gave a workshop on performing, and Bill Barr and Dave Gillies gave a workshop on teaching juggling. Gillies, incidentally, teaches at an elementary school in Philadelphia and he brought four or five students with him to the convention daily.

Thursday afternoon while the rest of us juggled, several of our number journeyed to the Alfred I. DuPont Hospital for Crippled Children to give a benefit show. Bill Barr was Master of Ceremonies and put together a show which included The Last Great Jive Ass Jug Band, Jon Held and Kit Summers with their unicycles and juggling, Tom Woodward, and Barrett Felker.

After a full day of juggling, Thursday evening was a time for movies. First a reel taken recently in Los Angeles or San Diego was shown which included film taken of Jon Held, Dick Francis, and others. Next a reel taken around Los Angeles in

the 1960's was shown which included film of a number of get-togethers of IJA members at Danny Rees's home, Fudi, and others. The next reel included Bobby May doing an absolutely incredible routine which left a number of us gasping. Next came film of a Russian juggler, who I believe was Sergi Ignatov (it was hard for me to hear from my position in the back of the room), who did a great routine. Next a movie made at the first IJA convention was shown with narration by Art Jennings, first IJA President; Art also showed a second film showing later IJA gettogethers around New York and Pennsylvania, but still in the first couple of years of the IJA. Dennis Soldati is making arrangements to tape record Art's narration to obtain a permanent record of this otherwise unavailable source of early IJA history. Art's films also included some frames of him juggling. Next Jerry Greenberg showed a series of commercials he has made for various people doing various bits of juggling, and finally Jerry showed a film of Adrian Sullivan doing his juggling act which featured virtuoso ball spinning.

Friday.

Friday morning the annual business meeting was held (see report elsewhere in this issue). After the business meeting many people went back to juggling while others watched a video tape that Mike Marlin The tape was made by a public service TV station in Houston about Mike as a documentary on a street performer. It was very nicely done. At about this point Penn Jillette arrived in the convention room creating a hubbub. is certainly not one of our more timid jugglers! Al Jacobs somehow managed to get involved in a sort of passing duel with Penn and held his own quite well. By mid-afternoon Friday, the convention center staff was beginning to fail in their attempt to contain the convention in the convention room and juggling suddenly filled the large handsome lobby area and did so for the rest of the convention. Fixtures in the lobby from then on were Bounce and Cy, helping all comers with gymnastics moves.

Friday evening was the public show at Brandywine High School Auditorium in Wilmington. The public show was co(continued on page 11)

BUSINESS MEETING REPORT

President Stu Raynolds presided at the annual IJA business meeting held at the recent IJA convention. Dennis Soldati gave the Historian's report, which will provide material for future issues of the Newsletter. Judy Burgess gave the Treasurer's report, which was an updated version of the report which appeared in the last Newsletter.

Dennis Soldati reported on the standing question of whether or not the IJA should incorporate. The benefits of incorporation are elimination of personal liability for the officers for their actions on behalf of the IJA, establishment of an entity which can receive bequests, and the possibility of obtaining non-profit status (I don't promise I am reporting accurately what Dennis said). Apparently it is easy and cheap to incorporate using a Delaware company which is set up just for the purpose of helping little groups and companies incorporate in Delaware. After years of discussion of the question of incorporation, it was moved, seconded, and almost unanimously carried that the IJA should incorporate. Dennis will pursue this.

Next there was a long discussion about protecting and regulating the use of the IJA emblem. It was decided to trademark the IJA emblem, and Dennis will pursue this also. It was also recognized that in many cases the IJA membership enjoys having things produced privately with the IJA emblem for sale to the membership. The convention T-shirt is a good example. From now on, people wishing to use the IJA emblem will have to ask the IJA for permission. Each case will be decided according to a policy which will be set which will attempt to balance the possibility of exploitation of the IJA emblem against the fact that the IJA is not in a position to manufacture items itself and it is often of benefit to the membership to have items utilizing the IJA emblem manufactured.

Roger Dollarhide gave a report on the project to microfiche the back copies of the Newsletter; it was decided that the Executive Board would figure out what to do in this area. It was also decided to include a copyright notice in future issues of the Newsletter, to protect the society's exclusive reproduction rights to the Newsletter. Honorary Life Membership was voted to Bernard Joyce, one of the

founders of the IJA, and also to Bill Brown, the oldest member present at the convention. Roger Dollarhide announced the rules of the championships coming up the next day, for anyone who hadn't previously read them; and he once again volunteered to step aside and let someone else be Championships Director.

Next came the election of officers for the New Year. The only serious proposal for next year's convention was from Tom Dewart and Larry Wakefield of Eugene, Oregon, and so Eugene was chosen as the 1978 convention site and Tom and Larry were elected convention co-chairmen. All of the new officers are listed on page 1 of this issue, and future issues of the Newsletter will include biographies of as many of the officers as respond to our solicitation. For the first time in recent years, the President was chosen to be other than the convention chairman. This was upon the recommendation of Stu Raynolds who felt that the IJA now needs a President to worry about policy issues, the growth of the organization, and so forth, and that the convention chairman has too much to do to also be president. Dennis Soldati was elected President and also elected Historian. Bill Barr, attending his first convention but obviously an activist, was elected Vice-President. Dave Walden was re-elected Newsletter Editor. After years of service, Judy Burgess did not wish to run again for the office of Treasurer, and Carol Benge was elected to the combined office of Secretary-Treasurer. The nominating committee recommended that the Directors have specific assignments. Roger Dollarhide was re-elected Championships Director and Hovey Burgess was elected to the office of Education Director. Art Jennings, the first president, and Stu Raynolds, the most recent, were elected Honorary Directors along with Bill Brown, oldest member in attendance. Roger Dollarhide was reelected Official Photographer, and snapped away throughout the convention. Lindsay Leslie was added to the list of foreign correspondents, in recognition of his continuing contributions to the Newsletter. Lloyd Timberlake, the only member from Europe present at the convention, and also a frequent Newsletter contributor, was also elected Foreign Correspondent, although he was out of the room buying a candy bar at that moment.

The business meeting adjourned with a round of applause for the convention co-chairmen. -- Dave Walden

CHAMPIONSHIPS REPORT By Roger Dollarhide, Championships Director

First I wish to thank the competitors in this year's Championships for their participation and great skill. I also wish to thank the audience for their cooperation. Special thanks go to Stu Raynolds and Joe Sullivan who were my cojudges, Bill Kahn who kept score, and Mary Wilkins who was time keeper.

Next, a brief financial report on the Championships: there were forty-eight entrants who paid \$.50 each for a total of \$24, and medals, ribbons, score pads, and xeroxed copies of the rules cost \$31.74; thus, there was a net loss on the Championships of \$6.74.

Now, the standings for the 1977 Championships (the scores for the first three finishers in each category are given and the remaining entrants in each category are listed in order of finish):

AUXILIARY EQUIPMENT: CHAMPION--Claude Crumley (on rolling globe, 46); 2nd--Steve Mills (on unicycles, 42.3); 3rd--Larry Vaksman (on bongo board and pogo stick, 22); Other entrant—Steve McFarland (on unicycle).

Finally, an explanation of the scoring: Except for the Numbers Events, scores shown are the average of the scores awarded by each of three judges based on 100 points total from each judge. Of the 100 points possible from each judge, there are fifty points possible for the number of tricks performed (by count) in three minutes and fifty points possible for originality, difficulty, showmanship, body movement, and routining. One point is subtracted for each trick missed. In the Numbers event, one point is awarded for each second the juggle is maintained, and the best score of four trials is recorded. See the published rules in the March-April 1977 Newsletter.

PROPMAKERS ACTIVE AT CONVENTION

Makers of props and other juggling accoutrement were active at the convention. Spiderman (David Mark) sold juggling rings. Joe Sullivan was selling convention T-shirts as well as props. Carlo (Charles Lewis) was selling his Juggle Bug Inc. (Dave Finnigan and Doug Colby) were selling Juggle Bug Tshirts and exhibiting their line of props. Brian Dube was doing a land office business with his new \$5 club. rather be juggling" bumper stickers were for sale by someone near where Joe Sullivan set up shop; perhaps Joe was acting as agent for The Juggling Company of San Diego, California. Other prop makers at the convention included Claude Crumley, Jerry Greenberg, Joey Jordan, and Stu Raynolds; and presumably each was doing a little business at the convention. No doubt there were also others selling things at the convention. Of particular interest were the activities of Juggle Bug Inc. Unlike most other prop makers who sell primarily to individuals who are already jugglers, Juggle Bug Inc. plans to merchandise juggling equipment to the mass market. At the convention Juggle Bug Inc. was primarily concerned with signing up regional sales representatives. Juggle Bug Inc. appears quite well organized, with a lot of promotional literature and a sizable inventory of their products. It will be interesting to watch their progress.

FROM THE EDITOR

At the 1977 IJA Convention, I was elected to a second term as Newsletter Editor, a vote of confidence that is appreciated. I went to the 1977 IJA convention ready to turn the job of Newsletter Editor over to a new person but willing to serve again if no one else stepped forward. I will not be willing to serve a third term, and it is not too soon for the membership to begin looking for next year's editor.

This issue of the Newsletter is the August-September 1977 issue, and it is going to press September 1st. There will be two additional issues in 1977, an October-November issue which will go to press Novemeber 1st and a December issue which will go to press December 1st. The December issue will consist only of the 1977 roster of members and the call for dues for 1978. In 1978 I will publish a January-February issue, a March-April issue, a May issue, and a June-July issue. These issues will go to press in mid-January, March 1st, May 1st, and in mid-June. The rest of 1978 will be the province of the editor who follows me. When I say that an issue will go to press at a certain time, I mean the time I turn it over to the printer. Submissions to be published in a given issue should be received well in advance of the date it goes to the printer.

Please submit material for possible publication in the Newsletter. Send news, instructional material, announcements, and anything you think may be of interest to other jugglers. Any correspondence I receive from other jugglers may be used in the Newsletter. Of course, the final decision as to what will be printed is up to the editor. As former Editor Keith Lingley put it in the August 1960 issue of the Newsletter, "I may rewrite your contributions for clearness and brevity and strike out some of the superlatives. Grammar, spelling, and punctuation will be corrected to the best of my ability, unless it is picturesque".

Ads will be accepted for publication in the Newsletter if deemed of value to the membership (value to the advertiser will not be considered). The ads must be as short as possible and in no case may be longer than one-quarter page long. An ad may be returned to the submitter for shortening if thought too long by the editor. No graphics or space-filled

layouts will be accepted. Ads will all be retyped in complete lines with as many words packed to each line as possible, similar to classified ads in newspapers. Ads will be accepted only as space allows. There will be a flat \$5 charge per ad. These rules are meant to maximize the usefulness of the Newsletter to the membership while minimizing the work for the editor. (continued from page 7) sponsored with the IJA by the Delaware Knights of Magic and one of their number, David K. Farrar, directed the show and was master of ceremonies. The Last Great Jive Ass Jug Band warmed up the audience before the first and second acts with comedy jug band routines and provided music as necessary throughout the show. The first act on the bill was Garbo and Jillian of The first the Celebration Mime Theatre of South Paris Maine, who for me were the hit of the show with their mime routine about "the tickle monster"; it was also a hit with the other kids in the audience. Next Mike Marlin narrated and performed his "Story of Life" three-ball juggling routine, and he juggled battle axes. Next Knight of Magic Joe Breeman did a routine of magic, and the first act concluded with Jay Green's juggling, unicycle, ball spinning, balancing, etc. routine. The second act opened with Steve Mills doing his juggling, unicycle, ball spinning, balancing, etc. routine, followed by a magic routine by George Proud, another Knight of Magic. Next Art Jennings did portions of his school assembly show of juggling and clowning. The second act concluded with Garbo and Jillian doing their mime, fire eating, and magic routine called "The First Date". Before the nonjuggling audience could escape, the IJA membership rushed to the stage for the traditional big toss-up.

We all then sped back the the University where Red Lynde showed his 16 mm. movies with sound from the Youngstown Convention. They were great, especially the slow motion sequences of club passing. In slow motion a club arriving at Judy Burgess's left hand reminds one of a space craft approaching and locking on to the space station in the movie 2001. Red also showed movies he took of Albert Lucas with the Ice Capades, Maja Rubtzova of the Moscow Circus, and movies he has of Truzzi at the Rastelli mausoleum, and of Rastelli juggling. As with the movie the previous evening of Bobby May, the Rastelli movie left us gasping. Dennis Soldati then showed a wonderful movie of the Elgins juggling group doing what amounts to a club passing routine but with straw hats; for instance, in a four person line formation, instead of dropping back a club to the person behind, the juggler puts a hat on the person in front of him. This is hard to imagine, and the trick is that they use less than three hats per person, but it looks great, and I hope to have a detailed description of the trick in a future issue of the Newsletter.

Saturday.

Most of the day Saturday was taken up by the competition, the results of which are reported elsewhere in this issue. There are certainly a lot of fine jugglers in the IJA. Competitors that caught my fancy included: Len Mazel and his smooth behind-the-back ball catches, and his ring, ball, and club moves; ten year old Joe Nagy who has been juggling for ten months and looks like he's been juggling for years; Larry Vaksman's stylish ball juggling including perfect behind-the-back kicks back into the juggle of a ball originally thrown over his head (incidentally, he does five balls with two in one hand and three in the other); Don Reed's exceptionally fast ball routine; Bob Geer trying to do the trick where one plate is spun on another with a square plate as the spun one; Vaksman juggling on a pogo stick; and Barrett Felker's and Ed Jackman's highly technical club juggling. During the competition, a Stu Raynold fiber-glass club was passed around and everyone autographed it, and it will go to the IJA archives.

Saturday evening was the banquet. Like all other facets of the convention, dinner was quite good and served with efficiency. About 200 people attended the banquet. At the head table sat Roger Dollarhide who announced the Championship results, Delaware State Senator Daniel Weiss who welcomed us to Delaware, Mrs. Ginger Weiss, Stu Raynolds who thanked everyone, Nancy Raynolds, Art Jennings who served as Master of Ceremonies, Carol Jennings, Prof. Nancy King who welcomed us to the University of Delaware, Nino Nannarone who thanked those who brought movies and helped with the workshops, Tina Nannarone, Tom Woodward who gave the invocation, and George Barvin who was the other founding member besides Art Jennings present at the convention. Incidentally, throughout the convention, Stu, Art, George and perhaps a very few others wore ribbons labeled to indicate they were among those who attended the first IJA convention thirty years ago. Sitting at each place at each table when we arrived for the banquet was a favor which included a handmade cloth prop bag made by Stu Raynolds's sister-in-law for each person; the bags were just the right size to hold a Stu Raynolds club! Art Jennings brought with him to the banquet a little clown figure with sign that was used at a certain magicians' convention more than thirty years ago to announce the lunch-time meeting at which the IJA was founded. (continued from page 11) little more history of the IJA, the reason for the IJA's existence, and told us how wonderful all we jugglers are. Finally Dennis Soldati was dragged out of the audience to say a few words about the IJA and to introduce the new officers. He was mercifully brief.

The banquet show as very enjoyable. Art Jennings continued as M.C. Performers were Bob Geer doing a spoof of a magic act, Locomotion Circus (Bounce and CPK III) doing their best acrobatics and equilibristics routines, Tom Woodward doing a clown mime piece, Ed Jackman doing as fine a devil stick routine as I've seen, Mike Marlin doing his first attempt at standup comedy, Bob Nelson juggling three, four, and five balls accompanied by the record of "Dueling Banjos", which was greatly appreciated by the audience, and Kit Summers and Jon Held with their routine of juggling on eight foot unicycles.

After the banquet show, we were permitted to stay in the convention center beyond our normal curfew of 11 pm. About 12 midnight the convention center night man began to try to get us to leave and tried several times in the next few minutes. Finally one of us gave him three balls and offered him a juggling lesson, and that kept him busy and us in the convention center for the next couple of hours. still wonder if we really managed to co-opt him, or if the IJA ended up paying for his time while he learned to juggle.

Sunday.

After the Saturday night session broke up between 2 and 3 am, there were a surprising number of jugglers back at the convention center by 8 am Sunday morning, determined to pack a maximum amount of juggling into their last day at the convention. A number of people left the convention at the end of the Saturday night session, and the rest reluctantly departed throughout the day Sunday.

Past President and Convention Co-chairman Stu Raynolds notes that the convention was attended by people from twenty-eight states, Canada, and England. Stu says, "many thanks to everyone for their cooperation with the convention shows, committees, workshops, and for simply showing up at the best attended convention ever. I hope to see you next year". I speak for all who attended the convention when I say it is we who owe Stu, his co-chairman Nino, and especially Stu's wife Nancy thanks for their enormous effort which resulted in a wonderful convention for us all.

BOOK REVIEW

The Art of Juggling, by Ken Benge, published by World Publications, Box 366, Mountain View, CA 94042, 1977, 6" x 9", soft bound, art covers, \$3.95.

This is a refinement and expansion of the author's 1972 book, 3 Ball Juggling. The line drawings and pattern diagrams have been clarified by Tom Henley and a few photographs by Carol Benge have been added where the action requires it.

The first chapter heading may startle you —— "The End: A False Stigma", but therein the author points out what juggling has done for him and can do for you. The following chapters cover The Cascade, Beginning Patterns, Stopping and Starting, Intermediate Patterns, a brief section on Balancing, Numbers Juggling, Bouncing Tricks, Partners Juggling which covers the basics for ball and club passing, Advanced Patterns, Performing, Juggling Props, and the final chapter entitled "The Beginning: A New Essence", a chapter worth rereading whenever a particularly difficult pattern whenever a particularly difficult pattern causes you to lose heart.

The chapter on Performing covers Routining, Presentation, Showmanship, and Juggling Bits, sixteen bits of juggling business that go over with audiences.

The chapter on Juggling Props helps to answer what every beginner wants to know -- where can I buy props or how can I make my own. Several prop makers are listed and ideas for making your own rings and clubs are given with suggested dimensions.

With the exception of the lack of an index, which would be helpful in finding the various patterns, the book is well organized with generally the more difficult patterns following in progression. A beginner will find this book second only to personal instruction. A more advanced juggler will find some challenging patterns, and anyone who has mastered everything in the book would be eligible to write a book of his own.

The book will be available at many general book stores as well as from your reviewer. -- Roger Montandon

JUGGLERS IN THE NEWS AND ON TV

IJA members Len Mazel and Phil Kavanaugh, who perform under the name of "Another Roadside Attraction", were the subjects of a feature article on the front page of the Sunday, June 5, 1977, edition of The Colorado Springs Sun.

Bob Blau sent a news clipping from the July 1, 1977, edition of the Houston Chronicle (section 7, page 3) which was an Interview with Phil Brown, President of the fledgling Texas Juggling Society (of Austin, Texas) who is also an IJA member and who in the interview discusses the growing popularity of juggling and mentions the IJA.

The MIT Juggling Club, in which a number of Boston area IJA members participate, was mentioned in the Monday, July 4, 1977, edition of The Boston Globe (page 10) for their impromptu performance in Boston's Waterfront park as part of Boston's three day 4th of July celebration. A picture of Sophie Parker in clown get-up was also included in the same edition of the paper.

There was an article on Paul Fegen on pages 37 to 40 in the July/August 1977 issue of Juris Doctor, a magazine distributed free to law school students. In addition to reviewing many of the facets of Paul's life and career of which we have already heard (his juggling, parties, car, law practice), the article featured Paul's business of leasing office space to lawyers and law firms.

On two Friday evenings in late July, CBS TV broadcast hour-long shows of the Moscow Circus. The second of the two shows included a performance by Sarbar Begbudy, a juggler on horseback. While the horse ran around the ring, he spun a sheet of glass on his finger, balanced four glasses on the sheet of glass, balanced the glass sheet on a stick and hit the stick out, catching the glass sheet, juggled three torches, and did a few other tricks. The TV show also included a lot of nifty hand balancing.

Ed Jackman was on the "Fernwood 2-night" show which was shown on national TV on Wednesday, August 3. Appearing in a "Bunand-Run" T-shirt, Ed did a three hamburger routine. In addition to juggling the hamburgers in a cascade pattern, he did

hamburgers under the leg, a one-high hamburger pirouette, hamburgers off the head, and he ate one of the three hamburgers he was juggling. Interviewed by Fernwood 2-night host Barth Gimble immediately after his routine, Ed talked with this mouth full.

Rawd Holbrook, David Mark, Eric Persson, Dave Walden and perhaps other IJA members were included in a video-taped report on the 3rd New England Clown Convention (in Salem, Massachusetts) shown on Boston's channel 5 on August 6. Persson was interviewed by the channel 5 reporter, and the rest were filmed juggling.

The August 18, 1977, edition of The Arlington Advocate of Arlington,

Massachusetts, included a picture on page 15 of Karla Petrowicz presenting her juggling act to a number of "special needs children" taking part in Arlington's summer recreation program.

The August 22, 1977, issue of The New Yorker included in the "Talk of the Town" column on pages 21 and 22 a piece on the Big Apple Circus. The Big Apple Circus is an attempt to provide a resident one ring circus for New York City, and it recently played a three or four week run in a tent pitched on landfill near Battery Park. The writer of the piece saw the show with Francis Brunn, who is quoted extensively. Jugglers for the circus were Michael Moschen doing his solo act and Paul Binder and Michael Christensen doing their comedy juggling act. Christensen is currently an IJA member and Moschen, Binder, and Brunn have all been members or involved with IJA activities at one time or another. Brunn is thought by many to have been the best juggler in the world for many years, and he had complimentary words for the other three.

Ron Graham, who works at Bell Laboratories in New Jersey when he is not juggling, is quoted with regard to a question in number theory on page 748 of the August 19, 1977, issue of Science in an article on cryptography.

The Sikorskys filmed a ninety second featurette for a new NBC television series, the Junior Hall of Fame; the piece is expected to be shown at least three times this coming fall, in the interstices between regular Saturday morning programming.


